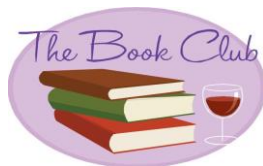

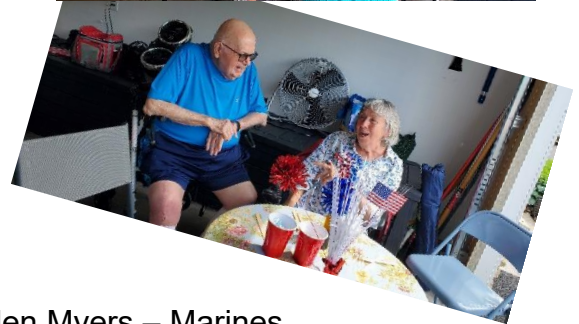
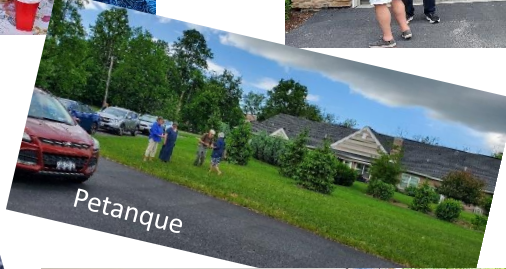

LET'S DO IT THE RIGHT WAY!

Here's a few facts about flying the flag. Sure, like me, you're pretty confident that you know all there is to know about flying the flag properly. But maybe not. After reading this, I had to go outside and change the way my flag was hanging.

There's a right and a wrong way to hang the flag vertically.

Don't hang your flag backwards, upside down, or in another inappropriate fashion. If you're hanging your flag vertically (like from a window or against a wall), the Union portion with the stars should go on the observer's left. Never dip the flag to any person or anything.



Avoid letting the flag touch the ground.

Know the difference between half-staff and half-mast.

There is a difference between half-staff and half-mast, even though they're commonly used interchangeably. "Half-mast" technically refers to a flag flown on a ship's mast, while "half-staff" describes flags flown on land.

Fly your flag on half-staff at the right times.

The flag is flown at half-staff when the nation is in mourning, such as for the death of government official or for remembrance, as well as from sunrise to noon on Memorial Day. When flying the flag at half-staff, first hoist it to the peak for an instant and then lower to the half-staff position.

Half-staff is defined as one-half the distance between the top and bottom of the flagpole. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day.

Only fly a flag at night if it is illuminated!

Always fly the American flag above other flags.

Only fly a flag in good condition.

Don't fly the flag when it rains.

Fold your flag before storing it.

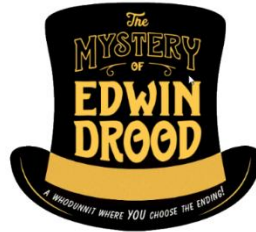
Need Assistance? Private Duty RN Available

Rochester Community Players Presents "Pericles, Prince of Tyre" by William Shakespeare



One of William Shakespeare's rarely performed plays—"Pericles, Prince of Tyre"—is coming to the Highland Park Bowl this summer as the 27th Shakespeare in the Park production by Rochester Community Players. Directed by Kathryn Rebholz with a cast of 15 actors, most of them playing multiple roles, the adventures of Pericles and his daughter Marina will be staged with an animated quality of a graphic novel coming to life on the park's large, outdoor stage. The story of Prince Pericles includes his quest to win a princess that instead leads to mortal peril and challenging adventures full of gallantry, love, and hardship. Years later his long-lost daughter Marina faces her own

treacherous journey. Yet their stories of death threats and bravery, shipwrecks and pirates, loss and love and never-ending challenges eventually lead to a happy ending.
